Dr. Mattie E. Coleman 1918-1939

- Dr. Mattie E. Coleman (an Organizer) was the first President of the Women's Missionary Council.
- In 1906, she finished from Meharry Medical College and began to practice medicine in Clarksville, TN.

Dr. Mattie E. Coleman 1918-1939

- She was instrumental in the establishment of the Nashville Bethlehem Center.
- She served as Dean of Women at Lane College for several years.
- Although she was busy with her medical practice, civic and social responsibilities, she always found time to do her church work.

Dr. Mattie E. Coleman 1918-1939

- The spirit of missionary work was her top priority.
- She worked, talked, prayed, until the Fourteenth General Conference, May 1918 in Chicago, Illinois, gave her and the missionary women permission to organize the Connectional Council.

Dr. Mattie E. Coleman 1918-1939

- Thus began the working of the present Council which has grown from 18 persons to over 120,000 in the past 95 years.
- She laid the foundation for the present Council.



- She was the longest serving president, serving 21 years - from 1918-1939.

Mrs. Rossi T. Hollis 1939-1955

- Our second President, Mrs. Rossie
 Thompson Hollis (a Builder) was born in
 Elhert County, Georgia.
- She was elected in New York in 1939, and served until 1955.

Mrs. Rossi T. Hollis 1939-1955

- She earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Lane College in 1910. She did further study in New York.
- During the years she was a Paine College, she taught Latin and served as matron of the girls' dormitories.

 Mrs. Hollis was a member of many organizations: Trustee Board of Paine College, Chairman of the World Day of Prayer Committee, and Vice President of the Oklahoma State Council of Women.

- Mrs. Hollis became a General Officer and was the first woman to be honored in that realm of the connectional church.
- In memory and in honor of Mrs. Hollis, the Children's Department was named the Rossie T. Hollis Children's Department.



Mrs. E.W.F. Harris 1955-1963

- Dr. Eula W. F. Harris (an Educator) was born on a ranch in West Texas.
- She was elected as the Council's third President in 1955.
- It was under her administration that it was voted to limit the term of the Council's President to eight (8) years.

Mrs. E.W.F. Harris 1955-1963

- She earned the Master of Arts Degree from Northwestern University.
- After leaving the public school system of Texas, she devoted herself wholly to church work.

Mrs. E.W.F. Harris 1955-1963

- When it was decided to edit a magazine she was selected as editor and in 1941 was a delegate to the Ecumenical Conference, which met in Oxford England.
- She was a delegate to six General Conferences.

Mrs. E.W.F. Harris 1955-1963

- She received an Honorary Doctor of Letters from Lane College in 1955.
- She was a member of the 1954 General Conference Resolutions Committee which recommended that the name of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church be changed to Christian Methodist Episcopal Church.

- She was a member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.
- The E.F.W. Harris Institute which is held annually at Texas College was named in 1991 as a tribute to Mrs. Harris.

Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford 1963-1971

- Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford, our **fourth** President, (an Ecumenist) was born in Jackson, TN.
- She was elected as President of the Council in Kansas City, August 17, 1963.

Ecumenist

Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford 1963-1971

- Mrs. Bedford traveled extensively in the United States and spoke in some of the leading churches in the late 70's.
- In 1960 Mrs. Bedford was appointed by the former president Mrs. E.W.F. Harris, under whom Mrs. Bedford served as Vice President, to represent the Council as a delegate to President Dwight D. Eisenhower's White House Youth Conference in Washington, D.C.



Ecumenist

Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford 1963-1971

- In 1961 she was named one of the 75 women across the nation to serve as a member of the 75th Anniversary Committee for the World Day of Prayer.
- She was elected by the Executive Board to represent the Woman's Missionary Council in London, England as a delegate to the National Assembly of the World Federation of Methodist Women in August 1966.

Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford 1963-1971

- She was named in Who's Who among American Women.
- The Young Adult Department is named in her honor.
- She served from 1963-1971.

Mrs. Pauline B. Grant 1971-1979

- Pauline B. Grant (an Innovator) was elected as the **fifth** president of the Woman's Missionary Council of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church, August 6, 1971 in Detroit Michigan.
- Previous to her election, she served in Missionary work at every level.



Innovator

Mrs. Pauline B. Grant 1971-1979

- On the Council level, she served as Editor of the Missionary Messenger—the official organ of the Women's Missionary Council.
- She initiated and began the President's Supper; developed the Division concept, established the first cookbook of the Women's Missionary Council and traveled to Russia, Ireland and England.

- The seed for needy college and vocational school students and candidates for Ministerial careers was planted under her administration.
- She helped to produce the drama; "SINCE THE CHURCH SAID YES –A Historical Look at the Women's Missionary Council."

 Under her leadership (1) a four year scholarship for higher education was finalized (the idea was begun under Mrs. Grant's administration), (2) paid the salaries of four of the teachers at the Joseph C. Coles, Jr. Basic School in Montego Bay Jamaica, (3) a Vitamin Dispensary in Port Au Prince, Haiti was sent an annual stipend and

- She co-authored the song We Are
 Missionaries, which was adopted as the official
 song of the Women's Missionary Council.
- Dr. Dudley earned the Doctor of Education Degree (Ed. D.) from the University of Central Florida.

- A gifted orator and published writer; Dr. Dudley was the author of *The Heart Can Be Healed*, (1993).


