





# Bishap C. James King, Jr.

Bishop C. James King, Jr. is The 63rd Bishop of The CME Church. He was elected July 1, 2014 in Baltimore, Maryland. Bishop King is the presiding bishop of The Fourth Episcopal District which includes the states of Mississippi and Louisiana.

Bishop King first Episcopal Assignment was the presiding bishop of The Eleventh Episcopal District which comprises the areas of East. South and Central Africa. The areas are: Burundi; Democratic Republic of Congo (Bwito, Goma, Kitchanga, Masisi, Nyanzale, Rutshuru); Kenya, Rwanda, South Africa; Sudan/Egypt; Tanzania, Uganda (Central, East, West) and

Zimbabwe In the areas of Africa Bishop King worked in the areas of building the Bishop Teresa Snorton Cathedral in Rwanda along with the development of the Dr. Nellie B. King Primary School and The Dr. Princess Pegues Primary School in Nairobi, Kenya. Also, Bishop King has worked with the on-going of The HIV-Aids Clinics in Nairobi, Kenya and Cairo, Egypt.

Bishop C. James King, Jr., is a 1966 graduate of The William H. Spencer High School in Columbus, GA. Bishop King is a graduate of The ITC Class of 1979 – Phillips School of Theology. Bishop King served as the presiding elder of The Cincinnati, Dayton and Indianapolis District in the Ohio/Central Indiana Region Annual Conference - Second Episcopal District of The Christian Methodist Episcopal Church under the leadership of Bishop E. Lynn Brown and Bishop Sylvester Williams, Sr. Bishop King has served as pastor of churches in Georgia, Washington, DC, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana. He serves as the President and Chief Executive Officer of Project One, Inc and has successfully placed over 18,000 youths in meaningful summer jobs and after-school programs in Louisville, Kentucky. Bishop King's partnerships and memberships include: The Louisville based Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance, Urban League, The Greater Louisville Chamber of Commerce, The Jefferson County Public Schools, The University of Louisville, Spalding University, The Kentucky Center for the Arts, Louisville Defender Newspaper, Toyota Motor Manufacturing of Kentucky, The Gheens Foundation, The Cralle Foundation, Kosair Charities, The Norton Healthcare Foundation and the NAACP. He has served as president of The Lincoln Foundation headed by the father of Whitney Young, Jr. He has been a president of the Student Christian League (The Student Government Association) at the ITC. He has served as the Alumni representative to the ITC Board of Trustees. He serves on the Board of Trustees at Texas College in Tyler, TX serving on the Finance Committee. Bishop King serves as Chairman of The General Board of Evangelism and Mission and The Commission for Social Concerns for the CME Church. Previously, Bishop King was the National President for The Fraternity of Masons, Inc; The National Board of Directors of the Opportunities Industrial Centers (OIC) serving with Dr. Leon Sullivan in Philadelphia, PA; National and Regional Faith-Based Conferences - Director. Bishop King received a B.A. Degree from Paine College in Augusta, GA, earned his Master of Divinity Degree from The Interdenominational Theological Center and received the Doctor of Ministry Degree from Ashland Theological Seminary in Ashland, OH. Bishop King has served on the ITC Board of Trustees as its Treasurer, Secretary, Vice Chairman and Chair of the Personnel Committee. Attorney Donald Hollowell was the first CME and lay-person of any denomination to serve as the ITC Board of Trustees' Chairman. Attorney Hollowell was one of the distinguished lawyers for the honored and esteemed Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. during the Civil Rights Movement. Bishop Charles J. King, Jr. is the first CME clergyman in his denomination to serve as the Chairman of the ITC Board of Trustees in Atlanta, GA. Bishop King resides in Louisville, KY.

He is the proud father of Constance Leigh King Young (Albert) and grandsons, Ethan and Edwin and a grand-daughter, Carleigh Elizabeth.







# The President's Report

Faulk, president emeritus, General Officers and their spouses, the Judicial Council, Connectional officers, Heads of Educational Institutions, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to this Assembly, Clergy, Laity, Ecumenical Guests, and all my beloved Missionaries:

In the name of Jesus Christ who commanded us to go out into the highways and byways to help spread His everlasting gospel, I greet you.

# My 24 Year Journey

This report is given in memory of my late beloved husband, Johnnie Pegues, who started on this journey with me in 1995 but was called home in 2007. But, I know he is rooting for me as he always did.

It is said that every good thing must come to an end and the time has come for me to turn the Baton of Leadership over to a new President. It has been my great joy and pleasure to serve the missionaries of our great Zion.

My journey began in 1995 when I was an applicant for Secretary of the Council which I thought I was qualified for- having three degrees: two in business and one in education and being a business teacher. However, I received a call from Dr. Thelma J. Dudley, who was the President of the Council at that time and she asked if I would change and apply for Editor of the Missionary Messenger which I did and was elected editor of the Missionary Messenger. I served eight years and was elected Vice President in 2003 and President in 2011.

During my tenure as President of the WMC, I have worked tirelessly to do the work as outlined in the Missionary Handbook. Our membership has increased thanks to all our hardworking Region, District and Local Presidents, and we are financially solvent! It has truly been a joy to serve the missionaries of the CME Church and my journey has been a rewarding one; however, I did have a few "bumps" in the road. But the "bumps" didn't stop me for it was my desire to serve the Lord and do the business of the missionaries as best I could, and I did just that. I am so grateful to those missionaries who supported and stood by me. If I could sing and I can't, I would sing "Stand by Me" as recorded by Ben E. King and sung at Prince Harry's wedding.

Since the Council was established, one of our major priority has been education. For we believe the adage, "Give a man a fish, and he'll eat for a day. Teach a man to fish, and he'll eat for a lifetime." This Quadrennial we have raised \$264,655,00 for Helena B. Cobb Scholarship Fund and \$93,451.00 for P. Ann Pegues (SOS) Save Our Sons Scholarship for a grand total of \$358,116.00. (As an old saying goes when some churchmen went to tell an old man that he praised the Lord too loudly in the church – the old man replied, "hold my mule and I'll shout right here!" "And again, they say missionaries just wear white!" However, let me tell you, when the white goes on, the work has been done!! This could not have been done without the hard work of the Region Presidents, the departmental secretaries, and chairs of the various committees and commissions, and without the great support of ALL OF YOU! - the members of the CME Church. Surely, I am drinking from my saucer cause my cup has overflowed. I am so grateful to all of you and on behalf of the Council, I thank you and please know that we realize that whatever we have done it is because of the Lord being our helper and the great support given at the Local, the District and the Region Levels. We have helped hundreds of students to go to college. See the Vice President's report for the details.

In the past four years, I have had some mountains to climb and some valleys to travel. In the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr, "I've had some difficult days." But, by the grace of the Lord, and through it all, I've made it. So, Lord, help me not to gripe about the tough rows that I've hoed, I am drinking from my saucer, cause my cup has overflowed."

In remembering the one who laid the foundation for the Council, a wreath was laid at the gravesite of Dr. Mattie E. Coleman on October 14, 2017 in Nashville, TN. We had lunch at Capers Memorial CME Church. These activities were under the leadership of Mrs. Doris Boyd and Mrs. Virginia Boyd. We were happy to have in attendance Patron Bishop James B. Walker, Bishop Henry Williamson, Bishop E. Lynn Brown, Bishop Thomas Brown, and Bishop William Graves. And also, in remembrance of our first president Dr. Mattie E. Coleman, the 2018 Centennial Executive Board was held in Kingsport, TN on February 15-20, 2018 at the Meadowview Resort and Conference Center.

In carrying out the mission as stated in our handbook, we not only serve here in the United States, but we have served our sisters and brothers abroad and have provided clothing and food to the needy and have made financial donations.

The accomplishments we have had, couldn't have been done without the support of the many CMEs and missionaries across the Connection. There is no doubt in my mind that God has orchestrated this growth, and to Him goes all the praise. The key to the success of our programs of blessing and assistance lies in the rock-solid commitment that you and other valued supporters display at every turn. I have never been more pleased, and sincerely proud, to be identified with a body of people who care so deeply for others in need.

## The Departments, Committees, Commissions, Regional Presidents

The Missionary Wheel of the Council has its spokes oiled and tuned and has been kept rolling through the diligent leadership and work done by the division leaders, departmental secretaries, committee/commission chairs, and with the very capable leadership of our Regional Presidents and the help of their dedicated and committed members.

The reports of the Regional Presidents, Department Secretaries, Committee and Commission Chairs show that they have been very busy (I encourage you to read these reports in the

Compilation Book) and have made tremendous efforts to carry out the The Great Commission: Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. And that you have put into action the scripture that says:... For I was hungry, and you gave Me something to eat; I was thirsty, and you gave Me something to drink; I was a stranger, and you invited Me in; naked, and you clothed Me; I was sick, and you visited Me; I was in prison, and you came to Me." (Matthews 25:36). On behalf of all the people you have helped, I say thank you for a marvelous job of being about God's business. I want to take this opportunity to highlight a couple of things.

We started a **Stole Project**. Many thanks to all of you for supporting the Stole project. This project was done to have an identifying tool for the missionaries /denomination and to help generate funds for the Council. Many thanks to Ms. Daisy Banks, past Council secretary, for handling the stoles and to all of you for your support.

We celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the Women' Missionary Council in Tennessee, the home state of our first president, Dr. Mattie E. Coleman. Our motto was: "Tell it to your children, and let your children tell it to their children, and their children to the next generation." (Joel 1:3)

We are cognizant of the fact that because of those who worked so diligently before us, we can say as Moses said to the Israelites: "You are living in houses that you didn't build and your houses are filled with all kinds of good things that you didn't provide, using wells you did not dig, and sitting under trees you didn't plant... so don't forget that it was the Lord who has brought you thus far." Deut.6:10-11.

And look where he's brought us from! Who would have thought and believed that from a small organizing group of about 41 women in 1918 that this organization would grow and become one of the most active and viable organizations of the CME Church? "Surely, I am drinking from my saucer, 'cause my cup has overflowed," and I am reminded of the poem that says, "I rather SEE a sermon than to HEAR one. Missionaries, THE ENTIRE CME CHURCH SEE A SERMON IN YOUR ACTIONS!

Because of the many unnecessary killing of our young males, we added a new program called **The Here I Am Ministries**. "Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send? And who will go for me us?" And I said, "Here am I. Send me!" Isaiah 6:8. This program was introduced in September 2011 and is an outreach program with the focus on the Black Family and Community Service to help alleviate some of the problems found in our communities.

The missionaries who serve at the local level – the "grassroots" or in the "trenches" if you will, are so dedicated and are truly "being about our Father's business" of doing mission at every opportunity and leaving the "walls" of the church and their meeting rooms to "take it to the "streets." I am so grateful to all of you for answering Jesus' call as Isaiah did, saying "Here am I, send me." I am convinced that God keeps blessing us to be a blessing to others.

Every Quadrennial, our four-year Helena B. Cobb Scholarship competition is held, and the top six winners receive \$4,000 per year for total of \$16,000 for each student which is \$16,000 x 6 = \$96,000 dollars. Then, the next two highest winners are awarded \$1,000 each for four years which is \$4,000 x 2 = \$8,000. That equals to \$104,000. The competition for the next quadrennial was held Sunday, June 23, 2019 and the winners will be announced at this Assembly.

For our P. Ann Pegues Save Our Sons (SOS) Scholarship Program, we have given seven male winners \$2,000 per year which equals  $$2,000 \times 7 = $14,000$ . As you can see, through the

Helena B. Scholarship and the P. Ann Pegues SOS Scholarship, we have invested in our students' education by awarding a total of **\$118,000.00**.

This quadrennial, we have also given 1,116 students our annual grant of \$200.00 which is a total \$223,200.00 that we have invested in the education of our students for this Quadrennial. As the preachers' say, "Somebody ought to say Amen and thank you Jesus." (See the vice president and treasurer's reports for the details). In addition, we have supported our colleges by making a financial donation to them.

As you know, President Obama has launched "My Brother's Keeper" initiative. The initiative is aimed at empowering boys and young men of color, a segment of our society which too often faces disproportionate challenges and obstacles to success. This program is still ongoing even though Obama is out of office. The Council's SOS Program (Save Our Sons) has some of the same objectives as *My Brother's Keeper*.

I have attended the Pastors' Conferences, Trustee Board Meetings of Miles College, the General Connectional Boards, One Church One School, and Phillips School of Theology and the Connectional Youth and Young Adults Conference, General Officers Meetings and the Unity Summit Committee Meetings.

As a servant president, I have visited churches across the Connection, participated in workshops, attended local and district meetings. I have served as guest speakers for women's day, missionary day and Black History programs and have served on various panels.

#### **Ecumenical Involvement**

The Council is affiliated with several ecumenical organizations. I have been active with most of our affiliated organizations.

#### Those Gone On

We have lost many, many, missionaries across our Zion whose names are called at each Executive Board. We lost Mrs. Mary Stallings, the correspondent to the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women and many more of our sisters were called home. They are sorely missed at this meeting and will be missed at future meetings. All our deceased members' names are recorded in our Necrology Book and will be remembered at our Necrology Service this week.

We are looking for ways to make our magazine, *The Missionary Messenger* cost-efficient. Currently, it isn't. Missionaries, we need your ideas and suggestions on this.

Our achievements and success are not rooted in ourselves. They are the product of God's matchless grace, upon which we are eternally dependent. I want to express my thanks to the College of Bishops, the Presiding Elders, Pastors, the Laity, missionaries and friends for the help and support you have given me on this journey and in the words of the great American author and poet, Maya Angelou, *I wouldn't take nothing for my journey now*.

Some of us are from the Moses' Generation (those of us who have worked and fought to get us to the 19th Quadrennial Assembly). So, I want to say to the Joshua Generation, our young women, that we leave hope that you will recognize and take up this legacy as yours to help move the Women's Missionary.

- 6. That officers on ALL levels subscribe to the Missionary Messenger.

# "A Snapshot of African Americans in Higher Education" By: The Institute for Higher Education Policy

After the Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s, 1968 assassination sparked riots across the U. S., President Lyndon B. Johnson commissioned a report to examine the roots of unrest in Black communities. The primary cause? "White racism" leading to discrimination in unemployment, education and housing.

African Americans have always recognized the value of an education and its power for transforming lives and communities. During the earliest years of U. S. History, African Americans were prohibited from learning to read and write. These efforts were designed to ensure submission while enslaved. Despite the risks, the Quaker community, other abolitionists and educated slaves remained committed to educating more African Americans

by secretly offering them tutoring and instructions. Even though educating African Americans was rare and dangerous in 19<sup>th</sup> century America, some higher education institutions began to provide access: Dartmouth College in 1824 and Oberlin College in 1833. In 1837, Richard Humphreys, a Quaker from Philadelphia, founded The Institute for Colored Youth, which is known today as Cheyney University, the oldest Historically Black College and University in the nation.

Historically Black Colleges and Universities were established to become "lighthouses" for African Americans who were prohibited from attending predominantly White institutions. The early establishment of HBCUs included Lincoln University in 1854 and Wiberforce University in 1856. Unfortunately, some HBCUs closed during the 20<sup>th</sup> Century because of competition, the Great Depression and financial difficulties.

Today, African American students are still challenged by the historical vestiges of discrimination as well as barriers associated with financial difficulties and other factors. The African American community's unwavering fight to obtain access to education has afforded generations of students a chance to graduate from college successfully. African American students, today, have made great strides in education not withstanding many bleak predictions and insurmountable odds. The nation's 105 HBCUs continue to provide learning opportunities for African American students and graduates over 50 percent of African American professionals many of whom serve in the fields of Teaching, Math and Science.

The standard of living and number of Black children enrolled in elementary school has increased over the past 40 years, according to a 2016 study from the Urban League. There has, also, been substantial progress in high school degree attainment for African Americans. In 1968, only 54% of Black Americans graduated high school while today 92% get a high school diploma. There are 4.5 million African Americans currently between the ages of 18-24, the traditional age range for those preparing for and attending college. This untapped student population represents a key source of human capital in an increasingly diverse nation. Education is undeniably one of the most important aspects of life. It helps us to develop as people, learning new life skills and improving our knowledge. All of this information is then carried across into our daily lives as an adult, helping us to become better, more informed citizens and enabling us to lead happier and more successful lives.





I'm pleased to announce that I am doing well and my undergraduate career will be ending soon. Four years seemed like it would take longer, but time has









Attached is a photo of myself and an NCAT Alumni that will be helping me throughout my professional journey with Cisco.





## Treasurer's Report

James King, the College of Bishops and their spouses and widows, Council Officers, Immediate Past President Dr. Elnora P. Hamb, Past President Dr. Judith E. Grant, President Emeritus Dr. Sylvia M. Faulk, Executive Board Members, General Officers, Judicial Council, Connectional Officers Delegates and Alternates of this Quadrennial Assembly, Missionaries and Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

I greet you in the precious name of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

It has been my honor to serve as the Treasurer for the Women's Missionary Council for the last eight years. While the work has sometimes been challenging, it has always been rewarding.

During my tenure as your treasurer, I always worked to insure transparency of the funds the WMC collected or disbursed. In keeping with our bylaws, a review of our records was completed by Selwyn Louis Blanchard, Certified Public Accounts for the period ending December 31, 2018. Based on their review, they were not aware of any material modifications that should be made to the accompanying financial statements in order for them to be in accordance with the cash basis of accounting. The Independent Accountant's Review Report is available for your review.

I have experienced two significant live events since our last Executive Board Meeting in February 2018. Ten days after the conclusion of the meeting my mother-in-law, Gladys M. Stern passed. Ms. Stern, a Past President for the Dallas/Fort Worth Region and a Past Division Leader for the Council, is the reason I got involved with the Missionary Society. She was with me in Schaumburg, IL in 2011 when I was first elected treasurer. I am saddened that she is not here with me in Shreveport, LA, for my final Quadrennial. 







# A Bit of History

The Women's Connectional Council of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church was organized September 7, 1918 at Capers' Chapel CME Church in Nashville, Tennessee. Dr. Mattie E. Coleman was elected the first president and Mrs. Helena B. Cobb vice president. In 1954, the name was changed to The Women's Missionary Council of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church. In 1942, the Women's Missionary Council was approved by the General Conference as one of the ten departments of the Church with its president having the status of a General Officer.

The Quadrennial Assembly shall be held in Episcopal Districts from which invitations have been extended by the Presiding Bishop and the Region Conference Women's Missionary Society President. Such invitations shall be extended at the First Executive Board meeting subsequent to the Assembly. The Executive Board shall vote approval.

The Women's Missionary Council operates at four {4} levels namely:

- The Council Level
- The Annual Conference (Region)
- The District Conference
- The Local Church

## HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY COUNCIL

- 1882- Mrs. Caroline W. Poe, mother of the Women's Missionary Society, asked that a Women's Connectional Missionary Society be organized. Her request was denied.
- 1886 General Conference approved the organization of a General Women Missionary Society to be governed by the CME Mission Board.
- 1887 The General Mission Board (make up of all males) wrote the first constitution of the WMS.
- 1902 Began the fight for a national organization for women at the General Conference. Helena B. Cobb was the leader of this movement.

  The request was denied.
- 1910 At the General Conference, the women led by Helena B. Cobb were once again defeated.
- 1918 At the General Conference, the Church said "Yes!" And on September 7, 1918 at Capers Chapel in Nashville, TN the women had an organizing meeting. Dr. Mattie E. Coleman was elected President.
- 1930 Name changed from Women's Connectional Missionary Society to the Women's Connectional Council
- 1941 "Executive Board" got its name from the "Board" members meeting each year.
- 1942 The WMC was approved by General Conference as one of the ten departments of the church with the president having the status of a general officer.
  - Helena B. Cobb established the \$100.00 scholarship for college students.
- 1946 General Conference gave the women authority to have Quadrennial Sessions.
- 1947 First Quadrennial Assembly held at Dunbar High School in Little Rock, Arkansas
- 1963 Length of time an officer could serve limited to eight (8) years.
- 1986 Name changed to the Women's Missionary Council
- 2009 Instituted the SOS (Save Our Sons) Program (The program was renamed the P. Ann Pegues Save Our Sons Program in 2010)
- 2013 Celebrated 95th Anniversary in Houston, TX
- 2018- Celebrated the Council's Centennial at the Executive Board held in Kingsport, TN

- The Quadrennial Assembly is held every four years. Officers, Departmental Secretaries, and Chairpersons are elected for a four-year term.



# Council Presidents 1918-2019

## Mrs. Mattie E. Coleman

Dr. Mattie E. Coleman (an Organizer) was the first President of the Women's Missionary Council. In 1906, she finished from Meharry Medical College and began to practice medicine in Clarksville, TN. She was instrumental in the establishment of the Nashville Bethlehem Center. She served as Dean of Women at Lane College for several years. Although she was busy with her medical practice, civic and social responsibilities, she always found time to do her church work.

The spirit of missionary work was her top priority. She worked, talked, prayed, until the Fourteenth General Conference, May 1918 in Chicago, Illinois, gave her and the missionary women permission to organize the Connectional Council. Thus began the working of the present Council which has grown from 18 persons to over 120,000 in the past 95 years. She laid the foundation for the present Council. Our Youth Department ages 12-17, is named in her honor. She was the longest serving president, serving 21 years - from 1918-1939.

## Mrs. Rossie Thompson Hollis

Our second President, Mrs. Rossie Thompson Hollis (a Builder) was born in Elhert County, Georgia. She was elected in New York in 1939, and served until 1955. She earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Lane College in 1910. She did further study in New York.

During the years she was a Paine College, she taught Latin and served as matron of the girls' dormitories. Mrs. Hollis was a member of many organizations: Trustee Board of Paine College, Chairman of the World Day of Prayer Committee, and Vice President of the Oklahoma State Council of Women. Mrs. Hollis became a General Officer and was the first woman to be honored in that realm of the connectional church. In memory and in honor of Mrs. Hollis, the Children's Department was named the Rossie T. Hollis Children's Department. She served 16 years from 1939-1955.

## Mrs. Eula Wallace Howler Harris

Dr. Eula W. F. Harris (an Educator) was born on a ranch in West Texas. She was elected as the Council's third President in 1955. It was under her administration that it was voted to limit the term of the Council's President to eight (8) years. She earned the Master of Arts Degree from Northwestern University. After leaving the public school system of Texas, she devoted herself wholly to church work. When it was decided to edit a magazine she was selected as editor and in 1941 was a delegate to the Ecumenical Conference, which met in Oxford England. She was a delegate to six General Conferences. She received an Honorary Doctor of Letters from Lane College in 1955. She was a member of the 1954 General Conference Resolutions Committee which recommended that the name of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church be changed to Christian Methodist Episcopal Church. She was a member of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority. The E.F.W. Harris Institute which is held annually at Texas College was named in 1991as a tribute to Mrs. Harris. The Life Membership Committee is also named in her honor. She served from 1955-1963.

## Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford

Mrs. Phyllis H. Bedford, our fourth President, (an Ecumenist) was born in Jackson, TN. She was elected as President of the Council in Kansas City, August 17, 1963. Mrs. Bedford traveled extensively in the United States and spoke in some of the leading churches in the late 70's.

In 1960 Mrs. Bedford was appointed by the former president Mrs. E.W.F. Harris, under whom Mrs. Bedford served as Vice President to represent the Council as a delegate to President Dwight D. Eisenhower's White House Youth Conference which convened in Washington, D.C. In 1961 she was named one of the 75 women across the nation to serve as a member of the 75th Anniversary Committee for the World Day of Prayer. She was elected by the Executive Board to represent the Woman's Missionary Council in London, England as a delegate to the National Assembly of the World Federation of Methodist Women in August 1966. She was named in Who's Who among American Women. The Young Adult Department is named in her honor. She served from 1963-1971.

## Mrs. Pauline B. Grant

Mrs. Pauline B. Grant (an Innovator) was elected as the fifth president of the Woman's Missionary Council of the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church, August 6, 1971 in Detroit Michigan. Previous to her election, she served in Missionary work at every level. On the Council level, She served as Editor of the Missionary Message—the official organ of the Women's Missionary Council. She initiated and began the President's Supper; developed the Division concept, established the first cookbook of the Women's Missionary Council and traveled to Russia, Ireland and England.

The seed for needy college and vocational school students and candidates for Ministerial careers was planted under her administration. She helped to produce the drama; "SINCE THE CHURCH SAID YES –A Historical Look at the Women's Missionary Council." Under her leadership, the Women's Missionary Council was engaged in the following areas of service: The program to combat Hunger in the United States and Sub-Sahara regions of Africa; the sponsorship of a Day Care Center in Ghana. One of her goals was to involve missionaries of all ages as the Council was expanding. She served from 1971-1979.

## Dr. Thelma Vivian Jackson Dudley

Dr. Thelma J. Dudley (known for her Leadership) was elected as the sixth president of the Women's Missionary Council in 1979 in Los Angeles, California at the Ninth Quadrennial Assembly. She was born in Columbus, South Carolina. She served as Vice-President for the North American Area of the World Federation of Methodist Women; Past Vice-President, Women's Missionary Council; Past Editor, The Missionary Messenger (1963-1967). Under her leadership (1) a four year scholarship for higher education was finalized (the idea was begun under Mrs. Grant's administration), (2) paid the salaries of four of the teachers at the Joseph C. Coles, Jr. Basic School in Montego Bay Jamaica, (3) a Vitamin Dispensary in Port Au Prince, Haiti was sent an annual stipend and she co-authored the song *We Are Missionaries*, which was adopted as the official song of the Women's Missionary Council.

Dr. Dudley earned the Doctor of Education Degree (Ed. D.) from the University of Central Florida. A gifted orator and published writer Dr. Dudley was the author of *The Heart Can Be Healed*, 1993. She was in demand as a speaker and had traveled all over the United States and to ten foreign countries lecturing in churches and presenting workshops. The Missionary Education Department is named in her honor. She served from 1979- 1987.

## Dr. Sylvia Moore Faulk

Sylvia M. Faulk (Social Activist) was born in Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada. She was elected the seventh Council President in 1987 in Orlando, Florida. She served as secretary of the Council's Children's Department, and also served as vice-president before being elected as president. She earned a Doctorate of Philosophy degree. Dr. Faulk was an advocate for the Missionaries at the Local Level. She coined the phrase: "If it doesn't happen on the local level, it doesn't happen." She emphasized the importance of Young Adults as active Missionary Members and stressed the importance of obtaining an education. She, like Dr. Dudley, was interested in affiliate organizations and served as Area President of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women. Under her administration, a new marker was purchased for Dr. Mattie E. Coleman's gravesite. The Council celebrated its 75th Anniversary during her tenure. She served from 1987-1995.

## Dr. Judith E. Grant

Dr. Judith E. Grant (an Advocate of Technology) was born in Pennsylvania. She served as the Secretary and Vice-President of the Council before being elected in 1995 as the Council's eighth President. Dr. Grant has the distinction of being the daughter of Mrs. Pauline Grant, the fifth Council President. Her primary focus was overseas missions. She received the Honorary Doctorate of Letters from Lane College in April 1997. Dr. Grant was a strong advocate for association and participating in affiliate organizations. She also raised the consciousness of a computer generated age. The council celebrated 80 years of service and dedication under her leadership. A strong advocate of Technology, the Council's website was established under her administration. She is a member of the CME National Communications, Information and Technology Committee. She served from 1995-2003.

### Dr. Elnora P. Hamb

Dr. Elnora P. Hamb (Communicator) was elected the ninth Council President in 2003 in Charlotte, North Carolina. An alumnus of Lane College, she received an Honorary Doctorate Degree from Texas College. Under her leadership, the health of women was focused on with the introduction of The Balm in Gilead Health Care Initiatives; The ISIS Project (Intimate Sessions for Informed Sexuality) which is designed to educate and empower Black Women about cervical cancer and HPV; Sister to Sister Legacy Luncheon, and encouraging membership growth on the council level.

Elected the Vice-President of the North America World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women for 2006-2011. She served on the Board of Directors for Church World Services and other ecumenical organizations. The Council celebrated its 90th Anniversary under her leadership. She served from 2003-2011.

## Dr. Princess Ann Rogers Pegues

A retired business educator, Dr. Pegues (a Doer) holds a B.S. degree in secretarial Science, a B.S. degree in Business Education, a M.S. degree in Secondary Education, and an honorary Doctorate Degree from Miles College. She was elected the tenth Council President July 1, 2011 in Schaumburg, Illinois. She had previously served on the Council level as Editor of the Missionary Messenger (1987-1995) and Vice President (2003-2011). Very cognizant of the plight of Black males, she instituted the Save Our Sons (SOS) Scholarship Program in 2004.

She is skilled in writing and has served as Editor of the Fourth Episcopal District Newsletter; Past Editor Church Women United in Louisiana Newsletter, special events reporter and contributing writer for the Christian Index. She wrote *A Walk through the Bible: A Booklet of Plays, Pageants, and Skits in 1991.* 

She has attended the annual Women Missionary Council Executive Board since 1976 and has been a delegate to 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th, 15th, 16th & 17th Quadrennial Assembly. She was a

delegate to the World Methodist Council – Nairobi, Kenya Africa (1986) and Official Observer of World Federation of Methodist Women (WFMW)) and World Methodist Council in 2001. Attended World Methodist Council – Seoul, Korea (2006) and the WFMW Assembly in JeJu Island, Korea in 2006 where she was the only Black American to teach a class. Attended the WFMW Assembly in Johannesburg, South Africa, 2011. She has represented CMEs in South and Zimbabwe, Africa and in Jamaica. Dr. Pegues has been a delegate to the General Conference from 1986 to 2010. She is on the Board of Trustees, Phillips School of Theology and Miles College. She was a member of General Connection Board for many years and served on the Ministry to Men Committee (the only woman on the committee). She is the Co-founder and secretary of the National CME Communications and Information Technology Committee (CIT). She served as Past Coordinator & Instructor, Missionary Institute, Louisiana and South LA Regions; Past Missionary Institute Director of Fourth Episcopal District. Past President of Louisiana Conference Missionary Society and established a Missionary Scholarship Fund and in 1991 the scholarship was renamed the P. Ann Pegues Scholarship. Dr. Pegues is the President of the North America Area of the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women. She is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority.
